The Collect of the Day

On this day the liturgy begins in silence.

Let us pray.

O God, you hate nothing you have made, and you forgive our sins even before we ask: Create in us clean hearts and restore a new spirit in us, so that as we confess our sins to you we may know ourselves to be forgiven in your great mercy; through Jesus Christ our Lord, who lives with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, forever and ever. **Amen.**

The Lesson *Isaiah 58:9-12a*

[Thus says the Lord:] Is not this the fast that I choose: to loose the bonds of injustice, to undo the thongs of the yoke, to let the oppressed go free, and to break every yoke? Is it not to share your bread with the hungry, and bring the homeless poor into your house; when you see the naked, to cover them, and not to hide yourself from your own kin? Then your light shall break forth like the dawn, and your healing shall spring up quickly; your vindicator shall go before you, the glory of the Lord shall be your rear guard. Then you shall call, and the Lord will answer; you shall cry for help, and he will say, "Here I am."

As we work together with him, we urge you also not to accept the grace of God in vain. For he says,


"At an acceptable time I have listened to you, and on a day of salvation I have helped you."

The Gospel *Matthew 6:1-6,16-21*

The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Matthew. Glory to you, O Christ.

Jesus said, "Beware of practicing your piety before others in order to be seen by them; for then you have no reward from your Father in heaven. "So whenever you give alms, do not sound a trumpet before you, as the hypocrites do in the synagogues and in the streets, so that they may be praised by others. Truly I tell you, they have received their reward. But when you give alms, do not let your left hand know what your right hand is doing, so that your alms may be done in secret; and your Father who sees in secret will reward you.

"And whenever you pray, do not be like the hypocrites; for they love to stand and pray in the synagogues and at the street corners, so that they may be seen by others. Truly I tell you, they have received their reward. But whenever you pray, go into your room and shut the door and pray to your Father who is in secret; and your Father who sees in secret will reward you.

"And whenever you fast, do not look dismal, like the hypocrites, for they disfigure their faces so as to show others that they are fasting. Truly I tell you, they have received their reward. But when you fast, put oil on your head and wash your face, so that your fasting may be seen not by others but by your Father who is in secret; and your Father who sees in secret will reward you.

"Do not store up for yourselves treasures on earth, where moth and rust consume and where thieves break in and steal; but store up for yourselves treasures in heaven, where neither moth nor rust consumes and where thieves do not break in and steal. For where your treasure is, there your heart will be also."

Invitation to Lent

Dear People of God, the first Christians observed with devotion the days of Jesus' passion, death, and resurrection; and it became the practice of the Church to prepare for them by a season of repentance and reconciliation. In this way, the whole congregation was conformed to the Gospel message of forgiveness, and reminded of the need which all Christians continually have to repent and renew their faith, and walk in newness of life.

Christ invites us now to the observance of a holy Lent. And to make a right beginning of repentance, and as a mark of our mortal nature, let us now kneel before God, our maker and redeemer.

All kneel, as able, for silent prayer.

O God, you made us out of the dust of the earth. Grant that these ashes may be a sign to us of the gift of mortality and the blessing of repentance. You take delight in all you have created, from you comes our joy, our healing and our salvation, help us to trust in your mercy, in the name of Jesus Christ, our Lord. **Amen.**

Turn us from walking in the shadow of death to following the way of your life. Create in us clean hearts and for the sake of your love forgive us all our sins. We ask it for the sake of Jesus Christ, who with you and the Holy Spirit lives and reigns, one God, now and forever. **Amen.**

Let us give thanks to the Lord our God.


It is right to give God thanks and praise.

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The Celebrant continues


