

The Collect of the Day

The Lord be with you. **And also with you.**

Let us pray.

Send down, O God, upon your people the flame of your Holy Spirit, and fill us with the abundance of your presence. Embolden our witness in the world to proclaim your wondrous work of raising Christ to your right hand. We make our prayer through our Lord Jesus Christ your Son, who lives and reigns with you in the unity of the Holy Spirit, God for ever and ever. **Amen.**

The Lesson Acts 2:1-17, 21

When the day of Pentecost had come, they were all together in one place. And suddenly from heaven there came a sound like the rush of a violent wind, and it filled the entire house where they were sitting. Divided tongues, as of fire, appeared among them, and a tongue rested on each of them. All of them were filled with the Holy Spirit and began to speak in other languages, as the Spirit gave them ability.

Now there were devout Jews from every nation under heaven living in Jerusalem. And at this sound the crowd gathered and was bewildered, because each one heard them speaking in the native language of each. Amazed and astonished, they asked, 'Are not all these who are speaking Galileans? And how is it that we hear, each of us, in our own native language? Parthians, Medes, Elamites, and residents of Mesopotamia, Judea and Cappadocia, Pontus and Asia, Phrygia and Pamphylia, Egypt and the parts of Libya belonging to Cyrene, and visitors from Rome, both Jews and proselytes, Cretans and Arabs—in our own languages we hear them speaking about God's deeds of power.' All were amazed and perplexed, saying to one another, 'What does this mean?' But others sneered and said, 'They are filled with new wine.' But Peter, standing with the eleven, raised his voice and addressed them: 'Men of Judea and all who live in Jerusalem, let this be known to you, and listen to what I say. Indeed, these are not drunk, as you suppose, for it is only nine o'clock in the morning. No, this is what was spoken through the prophet Joel:

"In the last days it will be, God declares, that I will pour out my Spirit upon all flesh, and your sons and your daughters shall prophesy, and your young men shall see visions, and your old men shall dream dreams.

Then everyone who calls on the name of the Lord shall be saved."

Hear what the Spirit is saying to God's people. **Thanks be to God.**

The Gospel John 15:26-27; 16:4b-15

The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to John. Glory to you, O Christ.

Jesus said to his disciples, "When the Advocate comes, whom I will send to you from the Father, the Spirit of truth who comes from the Father, he will testify on my behalf. You also are to testify because you have been with me from the beginning.

"I did not say these things to you from the beginning, because I was with you. But now I am going to him who sent me; yet none of you asks me, 'Where are you going?' But because I have said these things to you, sorrow has filled your hearts. Nevertheless I tell you the truth: it is to your advantage that I go away, for if I do not go away, the Advocate will not come to you; but if I go, I will send him to you. And when he comes, he will prove the world wrong about sin and righteousness and judgment: about sin, because they do not believe in me; about righteousness, because I am going to the Father and you will see me no longer; about judgment, because the ruler of this world has been condemned.

"I still have many things to say to you, but you cannot bear them now. When the Spirit of truth comes, he will guide you into all the truth; for he will not speak on his own, but will speak whatever he hears, and he will declare to you the things that are to come. He will glorify me, because he will take what is mine and declare it to you. All that the Father has is mine. For this reason I said that he will take what is mine and declare it to you.

O Risen Christ, because you dwell with us now in the power of the Spirit, a new creation has begun—all that was distorted is being restored, all that is corrupted is being renewed, all that was broken is being made whole.

We pray especially for those things for which we are most grateful, and for the other concerns of our hearts.

Please name specific thanksgivings and concerns.

We pray in the power of the Spirit: **O God, hear our prayer.**

The Celebrant concludes the prayers, saying

O Spirit of truth, whom the world can never grasp: move among us with the breath of your presence, fill us with desire for your disturbing peace, and fire us with boldness to speak your liberating word; through Jesus Christ our Lord. **Amen.**



The Great Thanksgiving


The Lord be with you. And also with you.


