

LITANY FOR THE SEASON OF LENT

We enter the season of Lent with a litany of penitence and hope, preparing ourselves for the transformational joy of the Resurrection. Join in the sung responses as together we renew our commitment to listen and follow where God is leading us on this great pilgrimage of faith.

The Celebrant intones

Let us pray for God's blessing in this holy season of Lent: Lord, have mercy.

The People respond to each petition:



We have not loved you with our whole heart and mind and strength: Lord, have mercy.

We have not loved our neighbors as ourselves: Lord, have mercy.

We have not forgiven others as we have been forgiven: Lord, have mercy.

We have been deaf to your call to serve, as Christ has served: Lord, have mercy.

We confess our unfaithfulness, our pride, hypocrisy and impatience: Lord, have mercy.

We confess our envy of those more fortunate than ourselves: Lord, have mercy.

For our intemperate love of worldly goods and comforts, and our dishonesty in daily life and work: Lord, have mercy.

For our negligence in prayer and worship: Lord, have mercy.

For our blindness to human need and suffering, and our indifference to injustice and cruelty: Lord, have mercy.

For lack of charity toward our neighbors, for prejudice and contempt toward those who differ from us:

Lord, have mercy.

For our waste and pollution of your creation, and our lack of concern for those who come after us: Lord, have mercy.

Restore us, Lord, and renew a right spirit within us. Lord, have mercy.

Accomplish in us the work of your creation: Lord, have mercy.

By the cross and passion of your Son, Jesus Christ, our Lord: Lord, have mercy.

And bring us with all your saints to the joy of his resurrection: Lord, have mercy.

THE COLLECT OF THE DAY

The Lord be with you. And also with you.

Let us pray.

Lord our God, in every age you call a people to hear your word and to do your will. Renew us in these Lenten days: washed clean of sin, sealed with the Spirit, and sustained by your living bread, may we remain true to our calling, serving you alone. Grant this through Christ, our liberator from sin, who lives and reigns with you in the unity of the Holy Spirit, holy and mighty God for ever and ever. **Amen.**

THE LESSON seated

Genesis 2:15-17; 3:1-7

The Lord God took the man and put him in the garden of Eden to till it and keep it. And the Lord God commanded the man, "You may freely eat of every tree of the garden; but of the tree of the knowledge of good and evil you shall not eat, for in the day that you eat of it you shall die." Now the serpent was more crafty than any other wild animal that the Lord God had made. He said to the woman, "Did God say, 'You shall not eat from any tree in the garden'?" The woman said to the serpent, "We may eat of the fruit of the trees in the garden; but God said, 'You shall not eat of the fruit of the tree that is in the middle of the garden, nor shall you touch it, or you shall die." But the serpent said to the woman, "You will not die; for God knows that when you eat of it your eyes will be opened, and you will be like God, knowing good and evil." So when the woman saw that the tree was good for food, and that it was a delight to the eyes, and that the tree was to be desired to make one wise, she took of its fruit and ate; and she also gave some to her husband, who was with her, and he ate. Then the eyes of both were opened, and they knew that they were naked; and they sewed fig leaves together and made loincloths for themselves.

Happy are they whose transgressions are forgíven * and whose sin is / put away!

- Happy are they to whom God imputes no guilt * and in whose spirit there / is no guile!

As sin came into the world through one man, and death came through sin, and so death spread to all because all have sinned-- sin was indeed in the world before the law, but sin is not reckoned when there is no law. Yet death exercised dominion from Adam to Moses, even over those whose sins were not like the transgression of Adam, who is a type of the one who was to come. But the free gift is not like the trespass. For if the many died through the one man's trespass, much more surely have the grace of God and the free gift in the grace of the one man, Jesus Christ, abounded for the many. And the free gift is not like the effect of the one man's sin. For the judgment following one trespass brought condemnation, but the free gift following many trespasses brings justification. If, because of the one man's trespass, death exercised dominion through that one, much more surely will those who receive the abundance of grace and the free gift of righteousness exercise dominion in life through the one man's trespass led to condemnation for all, so one man's act of righteousness leads to justification and life for all. For just as by the one man's disobedience the many were made sinners, so by the one man's obedience the many will be made righteous.




All turn toward the Gospel as it is brought among the People.


The Communion


THE BLESSING
