

Anglican Chant: David Hurd

David Hurd is a prominent African-American composer, organist, and choral director in the Anglican tradition, currently serving at the Episcopal Church of St. Mary the Virgin in Manhattan. He has held prominent positions at General Theological Seminary and Trinity Wall Street. His work is well-represented in the Hymnal 1982, and is frequently sung at St. Paul's.

THE EPISTLE Philemon 1:1-21

Paul, a prisoner of Christ Jesus, and Timothy our brother,* To Philemon our dear friend and coworker, to Apphia our sister,* to Archippus our fellow-soldier, and to the church in your house: Grace to you and peace from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ. When I remember you* in my prayers, I always thank my God because I hear of your love for all the saints and your faith towards the Lord Jesus. I pray that the sharing of your faith may become effective when you perceive all the good that we* may do for Christ. I have indeed received much joy and encouragement from your love, because the hearts of the saints have been refreshed through you, my brother. For this reason, though I am bold enough in Christ to command you to do your duty, yet I would rather appeal to you on the basis of love—and I, Paul, do this as an old man, and now also as a prisoner of Christ Jesus.* I am appealing to you for my child, Onesimus, whose father I have become during my imprisonment. Formerly he was useless to you, but now he is indeed useful both to you and to me. I am sending him, that is, my own heart, back to you. I wanted to keep him with me, so that he might be of service to me in your place during my imprisonment for the gospel; but I preferred to do nothing without your consent, in order that your good deed might be voluntary and not something forced. Perhaps this is the reason he was separated from you for a while, so that you might have him back for ever, no longer as a slave but as more than a slave, a beloved brother—especially to me but how much more to you, both in the flesh and in the Lord. So if you consider me your partner, welcome him as you would welcome me. If he has wronged you in any way, or owes you anything, charge that to my account. I, Paul, am writing this with my own hand: I will repay it. I say nothing about your owing me even your own self. Yes, brother, let me have this benefit from you in the Lord! Refresh my heart in Christ. Confident of your obedience, I am writing to you, knowing that you will do even more than I say.


GOSPEL HYMN standing; all turn toward the Gospel as it is brought among the People





The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Luke.



Jesus said "I say to you that listen, Love your enemies, do good to those who hate you, bless those who curse you, pray for those who abuse you. If anyone strikes you on the cheek, offer the other also; and from anyone who takes away your coat do not withhold even your shirt. Give to everyone who begs from you; and if anyone takes away your goods, do not ask for them again. Do to others as you would have them do to you." "If you love those who love you, what credit is that to you? For even sinners love those who love them. If you do good to those who do good to you, what credit is that to you? For even sinners do the same. If you lend to those from whom you hope to receive, what credit is that to you? Even sinners lend to sinners, to receive as much again. But love your enemies, do good, and lend, expecting nothing in return. Your reward will be great, and you will be children of the Most High; for he is kind to the ungrateful and the wicked. Be merciful, just as your Father is merciful."



SERMON

The Rev. Canon Harlon Dalton Interim Canon for Mission Advocacy, Racial Justice, and Reconciliation

Canon Dalton works with leaders throughout the Episcopal Church in Connecticut to live out their baptismal vows in three particular ways: by engaging in advocacy, pursuing justice, and promoting reconciliation. Racial justice is an explicit and central part of this work. It is matched by a commitment to address all of the fault lines along which power, privilege, wealth and respect are distributed in our society, including gender, sexuality, nationality, ethnicity, and physical/mental ability.

A period of silent reflection follows the sermon.

Do you believe in God the Father?

I believe in God, the Father almighty, creator of heaven and earth.

Do you believe in Jesus Christ, the Son of God?

I believe in Jesus Christ, his only Son, our Lord. He was conceived by the power of the Holy Spirit and born of the Virgin Mary. He suffered under Pontius Pilate, was crucified, died, and was buried. He descended to the dead. On the third day he rose again. He ascended into heaven, and is seated at the right hand of the Father. He will come again to judge the living and the dead.

Do you believe in God the Holy Spirit?

I believe in the Holy Spirit, the holy catholic Church, the communion of saints, the forgiveness of sins, the resurrection of the body, and the life everlasting.

Our version of the baptismal promises this week is taken from Martin Luther King Jr.'s "Commitment Card" for the Alabama Christian Movement for Human Rights.

Will you meditate daily on the teachings and life of Jesus?

I will, with God's help.

Will you remember always that the non-violent movement seeks justice and reconciliation, not victory?

I will, with God's help.

Will you walk and talk in the manner of love, for God is love?

I will, with God's help.

Will you pray daily to be used by God in order that all persons might be free?

I will, with God's help.

Will you sacrifice personal wishes in order that all persons might be free?

I will, with God's help.

Will you observe with both friend and foe the ordinary rules of courtesy?

I will, with God's help.

Will you seek to perform regular service for others and for the world?

I will, with God's help.

Will you refrain from the violence of fist, tongue, or heart?

I will, with God's help.

Will you strive to be in good spiritual and bodily health?

I will, with God's help.

PRAYERS OF THE PEOPLE

In peace we pray to you, O God, for the strength and courage to be your body in the world.

We are grateful, O God, for those whose lives inspire our own.

We pray that we may be more like them.

Help us strive to be true more than popular, and brave more than famous.

Make us yearn for true greatness in our midst—for those who build beloved community with all their hearts and all their might.

Help us to follow leaders who lead from love, and not the false leaders who lead from fear.

Give us the grace to discern true leadership among us, and within us; help us to become those who lead in our own place and time.

Let the spirit of Christ be alive in us all, to teach us the meaning of love.

And grant that we may be ready, like your servant Martin Luther King, Jr., to pay any price in the service of your kingdom.

And for what else shall we pray?

The People add their own prayers, aloud or in silence.

The Celebrant concludes

Almighty God, you have created us in your own image: Grant us grace fearlessly to contend against evil and to make no peace with oppression; and, that we may reverently use our freedom, help us to employ it in the maintenance of justice in our communities and among the nations, to the glory of your holy Name; through Jesus Christ our Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever.




THE GREAT THANKSGIVING

Eugene Hancock (1929-1993)

Eugene Hancock was born in St. Louis, Mo., on February 17, 1929, and unfortunately for the world of church music, he died in January of 1993. He attended the University of Detroit where he studied music, and then went on to the University of Michigan for graduate work. He earned the Doctorate in Sacred Music from Union Seminary in New York City. Hancock was a professor of music at Manhattan Community College and held positions in a number of churches in New York City, including the Cathedral of St. John the Divine and St. Phillips. From 1984-1990, Hancock was Director of Music at West End Presbyterian Church.
