

LITANY FOR THE SEASON OF LENT

We enter the season of Lent with a processional litany of penitence and hope, preparing ourselves for the transformational joy of the Resurrection. Please join in the sung responses, as together we renew our commitment to listen and follow where God is leading us on this pilgrimage of faith.

We confess our unfaithfulness, our pride, hypocrisy and impatience:

Lord, forgive us.

We confess our envy of those more fortunate than ourselves:

Lord, forgive us.

For our intemperate love of worldly goods and comforts, and our dishonesty in daily life and work:

Lord, forgive us.

For our negligence in prayer and worship:

Lord, forgive us.

For our blindness to human need and suffering, and our indifference to injustice and cruelty:

Lord, forgive us.

For lack of charity toward our neighbors, for prejudice and contempt toward those who differ from us:

Lord, forgive us.

For our waste and pollution of your creation, and our lack of concern for those who come after us: Lord, forgive us.

Restore us, Lord, and renew a right spirit within us.

Lord, restore us.

Accomplish in us the work of your creation:

Lord, restore us.

By the cross and passion of your Son, Jesus Christ, our Lord:

Lord, restore us.

And bring us with all your saints to the joy of his resurrection:

THE LESSON seated Genesis 9:8-17

God said to Noah and to his sons with him, "As for me, I am establishing my covenant with you and your descendants after you, and with every living creature that is with you, the birds, the domestic animals, and every animal of the earth with you, as many as came out of the ark. I establish my covenant with you, that never again shall all flesh be cut off by the waters of a flood, and never again shall there be a flood to destroy the earth." God said, "This is the sign of the covenant that I make between me and you and every living creature that is with you, for all future generations: I have set my bow in the clouds, and it shall be a sign of the covenant between me and the earth. When I bring clouds over the earth and the bow is seen in the clouds, I will remember my covenant that is between me and you and every living creature of all flesh; and the waters shall never again become a flood to destroy all flesh. When the bow is in the clouds, I will see it and remember the everlasting covenant between God and every living creature of all flesh that is on the earth." God said to Noah, "This is the sign of the covenant that I have established between me and all flesh that is on the earth."

THE EPISTLE seated 1 Peter 3:18-22

Christ also suffered for sins once for all, the righteous for the unrighteous, in order to bring you to God. He was put to death in the flesh, but made alive in the spirit, in which also he went and made a proclamation to the spirits in prison, who in former times did not obey, when God waited patiently in the days of Noah, during the building of the ark, in which a few, that is, eight persons, were saved through water. And baptism, which this prefigured, now saves you-- not as a removal of dirt from the body, but as an appeal to God for a good conscience, through the resurrection of Jesus Christ, who has gone into heaven and is at the right hand of God, with angels, authorities, and powers made subject to him.

All sing Refrain


God's pinions shall cover you, and under God's wings you shall find refuge; * God's faithfulness shall be a shield and buckler.

For God shall give the angels charge over you, * to keep you in all your ways.


They shall bear you in their hands, * lest you dash your foot against a stone.



Setting: David Hurd (b. 1950)

The composer of today's Sanctus setting, David Hurd, is a prominent composer, organist, and choral director in the Anglican tradition, currently serving at the Episcopal Church of St. Mary the Virgin in Manhattan. He has held prominent positions at General Theological Seminary and Trinity Wall Street. His work is well-represented in our hymnals, and is frequently sung at St. Paul's.



The Celebrant breaks the bread and invites the People to Communion, saying


This is the Bread of Heaven,

MUSIC AT COMMUNION sung by the Choir at 7:30pm

Words: Ascribed to Nokseng; as sung is Garo, Assam Music: Indian Folk Melody

The lyrics are based on the last words of Nokseng, an Indian man who converted to Christianity in the middle of the 19th century through the efforts of an American Baptist missionary. He is said to have recited verses from the twelfth chapter of the Gospel of John as he and his family were killed. The formation of the martyr's words into a hymn has been attributed to the Indian missionary Sadhu Sundar Singh, This hymn is an example of the many different traditions of music that have been adopted into the African-American sacred music repertoire.

ORGAN VOLUNTARY

Solemn Processional -- Robert A. Harris

Robert A. Harris is from Detroit, Michigan and was born in 1938. He holds a B.A. and M.A. in music education from Wayne State University. He briefly attended the Eastman School of music and then received a PhD in composition and theory from Michigan State University. Following this, Harris completed post-doctoral work at Aspen Music School. Harris Began his professional career as a music teacher in Detroit Public Schools, and then he moved on to become Director of Choral Activities at Michigan State University. About a decade later he joined the faculty of Northwestern University as a professor of conducting and director of choral organizations. Harris has performed internationally as a conductor including performances in South Korea, Republic of China, Hong Kong, and has also led master classes and lectures in South Africa, as well as a seminar on African American spirituals in Argentina. Harris has received many awards throughout his career but what stands out are the numerous awards for "Excellence in Teaching" from various educational institutions he has been a staff member at. Harris's career has been focused on composition and education in the classical music field.

The composer of today's Prelude, Adolphus Hailstork, was born in 1941 in Rochester, New York and grew up in the Albany area. Hailstork has led a vibrant career as a composer and educator, but also as a gifted instrumentalist playing the violin, piano, organ and singer. He holds a BMus in composition from Howard University as well as a BMus, and MM from the Manhattan school of music. Finally, he received a PhD in composition from Michigan State University. Upon graduating from his various degree programs, Hailstork immediately went into teaching, serving as professor at Youngstown State University before accepting a position at Norfolk State University as professor of music and composer-in-residence. Hailstork throughout his career has produced music that seeks to blend musical ideas from the African, American, and European traditions. He has composed music for just about every instrument and ensemble throughout a very lucrative career.
